City Council Quarterly Review

he City of Normandy Park City Council meets at least monthly to address City business. The City understands that the action taken at these meetings impacts your daily life, so we want to keep you informed. Here is a summary of the highlights of the City Council meetings from September through December 2023.

Police Officers Ceremonial Oath of Office

Chief Yourkoski administered the Ceremonial Oath to our two new Police Officers. Welcome to Garrett Strand and Garett Gredell.

2024 Legislative Agenda Adopted

The City Council approves a Legislative Agenda each year to define its priorities for the upcoming year. The focus of the 2024 legislative Agenda is on Public Safety, Behavioral Health Resources, the Environment, Transportation, and revision of the Property Tax Cap. To help promote this agenda, The City Council invited our state legislators. Senator Karen Keiser, Representative Tina Orwall, and Representative Mia Gregerson all attended a City Council meeting to talk about their past successes and future priorities that impact the residents of Normandy Park. The City Council also used this time to express its priorities for 2024.

Presentations made to the City Council:

- Mt. Rainer Pool came to highlight the programs they offer and talk about how Normandy Park's financial support helps its operations. Since 2009, the City of Normandy Park has contributed annually towards the pool. Because of this, Normandy Park residents enjoy discounted rates, priority registration, and scholarship access for certain programs.
- Waste Management presented its Annual Report. They reported on Normandy Park's waste stream, its community engagement efforts, and its public recycling center tours.
- Normandy Park Preschool Director Diane Brissenden gave a
 presentation regarding the preschool program. We learned
 about the preschool's history, enrollment, and successful
 focus on play to encourage learning.
- PROS Plan The City is updating its Parks, Recreation, and Open Space (PROS) Plan. The City Council heard more from our consultant on the public input and how the plan was developing for our hidden gem of a city.

Approved Ordinances, Resolutions, & Contracts

- A contract for the design and construction management of the Storm and Sidewalk projects planned for 2024.
- Amendment to the Waste Management contract. This amendment was needed to comply with King County's rate restructuring related to solid waste.
- Resolution setting the 2024 property tax levy. The new rate will be 1.56748 vs. the 1.6000 rate used in 2023. What does this rate mean? For every \$1,000 of assessed value of your home, you will pay \$1.57. Remember to use the assessed value established by the King County Assessor's Office and not market value (i.e., Zillow, Redfin) when calculating your property taxes.
- Resolution ratifying the King County Countywide Planning Policies (CPPs). For background, CPPs are the shared and consistent framework for growth management planning for all jurisdictions in King County.
- Ordinance #1060 which amended the 2023-2024 budget. Budgets are financial plans, and there will always be certain transactions unknown at the time when the budget was adopted. Because of this, local governments are required to review and amend the budget as needed every year.
- Resolution #1009 approving the 2024 City of Normandy Park Fee Schedule. The City has a financial policy to review all fees annually, and when appropriate, user charges and fees should reflect the full cost of providing the related service.
- Contract to implement a Records Management System (RMS).
 Benefits of this program include greater staff efficiency, long-term cost savings, and improved public service.

Proclamations

September was recognized as National Recovery Month and Childhood Cancer Awareness Month.

Commission Appointments

Resident Raymond Street was reappointed to the Arts Commission.






Erin Smith City Clerk

This program collects new unwrapped toys and provides them to other charitable groups throughout King County to




ensure all kids have the opportunity for a Happy Holiday.

Building a New Park and Pathways for Salmon: Salmon View Park 2023 Grant Funding Tracker

he City is actively seeking grant funding to bring a new park, Salmon View
Park, to life. Residents will be able to enjoy a new open space park dedicated to salmon viewing, but first, the city must replace several culverts conveying Walker Creek and Sequoia Creek. The culverts have been identified as fish passage

barriers by the Department of Fish and Wildlife. One of the most vital salmon recovery tools includes the correction of human-made fish passage barriers such as undersized culverts. Nearly 300 million in federal and state funding opportunities have been earmarked for fish barrier removal and salmon recovery.

This targeted funding could not come at a more crucial time. This will help minimize the amount of Normandy Park general funds used for construction of the culverts and the creation of Salmon View Park.



2023 Update on City's Online Permitting System A "Win" for our Residents

ormandy Park's online permitting system, SmartGov, has had a successful first full year for our customers and community stakeholders. Streamlining the permitting process online, including application and document submittal, payments, review, revisions, and integrated inspections, has resulted in significant efficiency in Normandy Park's permit process system. Here is some information on how everything is working.

Application Intake

Applications made in 2023 outpaced 2022's record year—658 to 575, respectively. This is the total of SmartGov online permit applications and our traditional paper "in-house" system. Seventy-seven percent of those permit applications were made in SmartGov—a rapid and significant shift away from the paper system.

Permit Issuance

SmartGov's efficiency in processing, reviewing, and issuance of permit applications has resulted in 501 permits issued (YTD), an increase of nearly five percent over 2022's 479 permits issued through the paper system. Also, the permit issuance timeline has become significantly more efficient. Figure 1 illustrates this.


- Online building permit applications now average 28 days to issue compared to an average 97 days for "paper."
- Online over the counter (OTC) applications now average less than two days to issue compared to the seven-to-eight-day process of receiving, paying invoices and issuing "paper" OTC permits.

Inspection Services

Although the total number of received inspection requests has declined, the goal of inspection services performance is to continue providing consistent service which meets the quickly changing needs of our customers. See Figure 2.

Consistency has been the hallmark of 2023's intake and performance of inspection requests—far more than 2022. This is illustrated in Figure 3. Predictability plays a larger role with this smoothing out of the inspection process. Both our SmartGov and paper in-house permit systems ensure that inspection services will continue to be provided in an efficient and effective manner.

SmartGov's efficiency in processing, reviewing, and issuance of permit applications has resulted in 501 permits issued.

INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Talk to city staff about what you want to prepare. Is it a meal or just hors d'oeuvres? Remodels and additions sometimes require as much as a new house.
- 2. Do you have the right pots and equipment? Understand what you will need to provide in an application before you engage contractors.
- 3. Prepare your list of ingredients (see to the left.) For fees, the charge is based on an accurate valuation of your project.
- 4. Hiring a "chef", or doing it yourself? A Normandy Park business license is necessary for both. Some parts of the city code require professional certification for work to be approved.
- 5. Submit a complete application. This means that you have turned in everything² that is required on the application and checklist. The most common reason for "burned food" (delays in review) is not submitting all required materials.
- 6. Ask if you do not understand what you are paying for. If the city has to bring in "kitchen staff" (our contract consultants) then the applicant will pay for that.
- 7. A watched pot does boil; if you contact the city for review status let your professional know that you have done so. Work with your professional to ensure that only one of you is responding to requests for additional information.
- 8. Like a popular restaurant, the city is preparing a lot of meals at the same time. All of us appreciate that needed patience.
- 9. As you complete the course, be sure to clean up—understand inspection and occupancy requirements.

- The \$50 Annual User Fee is due April 5, 2024. If the fee is not paid by April 5, 2024 the plot will be given to the first person on the waiting list.


